Wayland native and WHS life-member Bob Dorey will talk about Wayland's truck farms and roadside stands and their operation during the 1900s. Wayland farms – many now residential developments such as "Plainview Estates", and those on Decatur and Moore Roads – produced vegetables, dairy products and livestock for local and Boston markets through much of the 20th century. Drawing from personal experience working as a teenager at local farms, and from information pass down to him by older residents, Bob will discuss local landmarks such as Lee's Farm Market, Mainstone Farm, Watertown Dairy, Pinky Smith's Farmstand, Walnut Hill, Harrington's and the Hynes' farms.
